



President's Message Dennis C. Bangs (Ecuador 70-72)

As spring arrives in western Montana the WMRPCV group finds itself involved in numerous activities and preparing for the spring and summer activities, including the annual gathering at Flathead Lake, known as the Goat Chase Retreat.

First I would like to thank the hosts of the past potlucks. In December, Reggie and Scott Spaulding (Fiji 1993-96) stepped up and hosted the Christmas Potluck, which had a great turnout. Then in February Shannon and Russ Parsons (Ecuador 1995-97) hosted a potluck at their place on a Sunday evening, because it worked out good for them, and we had a great turnout as well. Shannon also shared with us the experience she had with the Missoula Medical Aid in Honduras in January.

Bunny Sims (Philippines 1973-76) has been coordinating speakers in the local schools all month for Peace Corps Week. A few presentations are yet to come so I can't report how many happened. Thanks Bunny. Also thanks to the people who volunteered at the Peace Corps information at the U of M International Food Fair and Cultural Festival on March 22.

Missoula's connection to Honduras by YWCA Volunteer Shannon Parsons

Missoula Medical Aid (MMÅ) was started by a group of concerned health care professionals in Missoula who wanted to help Honduras when Hurricane Mitch hit in 1998. Back then, they connected with a non-profit called Save the Children and MMA has been going ever since. It is a unique organization in that its funding and volunteer base are in Missoula. In January, I was fortunate to accompany them to serve as a translator.

We went as a group of 15 including doctors, nurses, translators, and pharmacy helpers. Every day we would load up crates of medical supplies, pile into trucks, and head out to rural communities, stopping to pick up Honduran doctors and nurses to come with us. The communities we went to were pre-arranged by Save the Children. When we arrived, there would be over 100 people waiting for us. Many had walked for miles to get there.

Help in Ethiopia:

At the end of January Lynne and Otto Koester (Ethiopia 1968-70) sent a request for financial support for a school they befriended along with their report on their activities in Ethiopia. Following is part of the description of the school from Lynn.

The Atse Fasil Elementary School in Azezzo is a short distance from Gondar City, but in a more rural area where the poverty seems to be even more rampant and visible. (Otto and I are both reminded of many scenes from our Peace Corps days in Debre Berhan and Sendafa.) The particular classroom of interest is one of only 2 in this area specifically for children with disabilities – in this case, blindness, deafness, intellectual disabilities (including autism) and milder learning disabilities. Children are in grades 1-3, but their ages tend to be much older than normally expected for these grades due to the fact that their families have held them back or even kept them hidden for fear of stigmatization and discrimination. Some of the children have lost parents due to HIV/AIDS and are now being cared for by grandparents. Students with intellectual disability can actually stay in this classroom for 4 years maximum, but if they're not making sufficient progress to then be moved up, they are forced to withdraw altogether. Once they advance into the regular classrooms, they will no longer have teachers with the special training that includes sign language and Braille, therefore much of their support will disappear. Nevertheless, if they have received a solid foundation in these early years and are deemed ready to be in an "inclusive" classroom, these students may at least be able to continue their schooling.

Through our calendar sales we were able to donate \$250 to their cause.

The registration fee of \$75 includes the use of the many recreational facilities the camp has, from canoes to volleyball and ping pong.
