



Our official business consisted of reelecting the standing slate of officers.



Next year will be the 25th year of our annual meeting, known as the "Goat Chase Retreat." Like always it will be on the second weekend in June at the Flathead Methodist Church Camp on Flathead Lake. But unlike always it will be special in many ways, so don't forget to put June 10, 11 and 12 on your 2016 calendar.



Marian Palaia's first novel:

Marian served as a Peace Corps volunteer in Nepal in the late 90s and returned to Missoula, where she had lived for a while in the past. She became a member of the Western Montana RPCVs and attended quite a few of our events and we enjoyed her involvement in our community.

She then moved to Madison, Wisconsin where she got her MFA and is now living in San Fransisco, and sometimes returning to Missoula. She has just published her first novel and recently returned to Missoula for a book reading at Shakespeare and Company.

The book tells the story of a Montana girl, Riley, from the Hiline who losses her older brother and best friend in the Vietnam war. The story follows Riley and her search for answers to life's questions to Missoula, San Fransisco and Vietnam. Her travels through her numerous relationships and intriguing, colorful characters makes the story compelling.

Marian's description and explanation of the relationships with the people in Riley's life bring the novel to life in a harsh but dramatic way. She explores the relationships of families in the small town and reservation communities of rural Montana. When Riley travels to Missoula then to San Fransisco we get an insight into an unsettled and

questioning world, largely because of the societal crises that the Vietnam War unleashed on the country. She is one of the many people whose life is altered by the draft, anti-war rallies, draft dodgers fleeing to Canada and a myriad of counter-cultural activities Riley has many demons to work out in her life and runs into many other people with similar and even more frightening demons to deal with.

Marian's gifted writing captures the flavor of the unsettled generation by vividly sharing the personal struggles of her characters who come alive under her skillful narrative. Even though the book is not really a mystery it is a real page turner because of the interesting and complete characters and the dramatic scenarios they find themselves in.

The book is published by Simon and Schuster and is available at Shakespeare & Company and on Amazon.





Chuck McConnell came to Peace Corps service (Ukraine 2008-2010 and Peace Corps Response Ukraine 2011) after two careers.

His first career was in public broadcasting stations, from WETA/Washington to KUAC/Fairbanks, Alaska. In between – stops in Philadelphia; Wilmington, Delaware; Rochester, New York; Trenton, New Jersey; and Seattle. During those years, he worked in various roles, almost always focused on programming and production.

His second career was in association management. In 1987, he "rose from the field" to work for National Educational Telecommunications Association, the association management company serving the public broadcasting industry. He worked in three areas during his 20+ years at NETA. For the first ten, he gate-kept a stream of TV programs used by PTV stations nationwide. For the second ten, he worked in conference planning/production and served as chief staff officer for one of NETA's client associations, a professional society for finance, accounting and HR professionals at public broadcasting stations and public broadcasting's national organizations. While at NETA, he earned the association industry's CAE designation.

He left that work to join Peace Corps, serving in Nikolaev, Ukraine, 2008-2010 as a community development volunteer. During that time, he helped a nascent association of Ukrainian universities develop a model policy on academic freedom. In 2011, he returned to Ukraine for a short Response assignment, teaching English in Zhytomyr.

After Peace Corps, he settled in Portland, Oregon where he mediates for Multnomah County Small Claims Court, Oregon's Foreclosure Avoidance Mediation Program and Clark County (Washington) Small Claims Court. He keeps his hand in on events production through work with Portland's legendary Oregon Museum of Science and Industry. And he plays bluegrass fiddle.

Other interests include aviation – he's a general aviation pilot and flight instructor and a credentialed rater of aviation English.

He holds an undergraduate degree from American University in Washington, DC, and a Masters from the University of Oklahoma.
